BERLIN, March 1936. Scholars have confirmed a marked decline in the “aura” of artworks following the rise of photography and film.

Experts explain that mechanical reproduction allows people to encounter masterpieces without physical proximity, eroding the reverence once reserved for the original.

“Images that once required pilgrimage now appear freely in magazines and cinemas,” one critic remarked.

Officials insist the phenomenon represents cultural progress, granting art to the masses, while purists mourn its demystification. Others warn that if the trend continues, authenticity itself may soon become a historical curiosity.



THE AURA ACT



(1936)

**An Act to Regulate the Circulation of Feeling in the Age of
Mechanical Reproduction.**

Clause 1:

Aura, a sentimental haze surrounding the original, shall henceforth be considered non-essential.

Clause 2:

Copies shall enjoy equal rights under law; any attempt to privilege the authentic constitutes aesthetic elitism.

Clause 3:

Citizens are encouraged to consume images responsibly, one reproduction at a time.

Clause 4:

Unauthorized reverence is prohibited.

Clause 5:

The Ministry will conduct annual audits of awe, nostalgia, and related inefficiencies.

Effective immediately, this Act modernizes beauty for public distribution and ensures no artwork remains dangerously unique.


